### Canadians love Hawaii



#### Canada invests in Hawaii

Trade with Canada supports **38,500 employees in Hawaii** in addition to the **1,300 employees** at Canadian-owned businesses across the state. In addition, Hawaii exports \$271 million in goods and services to Canada.

Canadian-owned companies, including **TForce**, **Nordic PCL**, **Oahu Publications** and **Ledcor**, are major contributors to Hawaii's economy. They employ residents in every sector and contribute to the local economy with salary dollars, paying local taxes, and the purchase of goods and services in their supply chain.

## Tourism in Hawaii


**Air Canada**, the only four-star international network carrier in North America, is Canada's largest airline and the largest provider of scheduled passenger services in the Canada-U.S. transborder market, and in the international market to and from Canada.

Air Canada and its predecessor carriers have proudly served Hawaii for decades. Hawaii is an important part of Air Canada's international leisure network, and today, Air Canada operates flights to Honolulu and Maui year-round, and to Kona on a seasonal basis. Canadians are the second largest foreign tourist group that travels to Hawaii with over 450,000 annual visitors in 2023.
