
MAINE & CANADA An integrated economy



Working together in the Gulf of Maine

Canada and Maine continue to work closely together studying our oceans, whether in the Gulf of Maine or further afield. Joint research topics include the warming of the Gulf, the North Atlantic Right Whale, or the lobster fishery management. One example is a research project with the **Bigelow Laboratory for Ocean Sciences** "downeast" in East Boothbay, Maine, and **Memorial University** in Newfoundland and Labrador, studying phytoplankton in the Labrador Sea. In the words of Dr. Rachel Sipler: "Being able to gather a range of data and observe it through so many scientific lenses gives us a more complete view of the system. The data we gathered will inform our understanding of how carbon moves through this critical area for years to come."






Manulife buys Maine timberland for carbon sequestration

Hancock Natural Resource Group Inc., a subsidiary of Canadian-owned Manulife Financial Corp., has bought a large tract of forest in Maine to maintain as a carbon sink and source of revenue from third-party emitters seeking offsets in a growing voluntary market. The Boston-based Hancock Natural Resource Group Inc. has acquired more than 36,000 hectares of timberland along the border with Québec. It will use the investment to generate income from selling carbon offsets and harvesting timber. The voluntary carbon offset market, where companies can purchase credits to counteract their own emissions, is worth billions of dollars and expected to grow in the future.

Helping to reduce Presque Isle's carbon footprint

Player Design is a Presque Isle based manufacturer of environmentally sustainable biomass processing systems for the forestry and agriculture sectors. These systems not only allow the use of waste residuals, enhancing the value of what was once discarded, but also significantly reduce the carbon footprint of their clients. They rely on exports for their over 20 employees in Presque Isle and Westbrook, and Canada is by far their number one export market.
